General Membership Meeting • May 2010
ITC Headquarters • Novi, MI

We did it! We gained access to the ITC campus in Novi.

During our business meeting, Kim Tassen was presented with her SRWA Certificate from Pat Petitto (near right.) Then, Mike Lohmeier (top right) and Jason LeRoy (bottom right) gave a great presentation on all the facets of real estate valuation.

After lunch, came the ITC tour and presentation: ITCTransmission, is the first independently-owned and operated electricity transmission company in the United States. ITCTransmission is in the business of transmitting high voltage electricity from generating facilities in southeastern Michigan, other Midwestern states and Ontario to distribution substations, serving a population of approximately 4.9 million people in an area comprised of 13 southeastern Michigan counties, including the Detroit metropolitan area. Their assets consist of approximately 2,700 circuit miles of transmission lines, approximately 17,000 transmission towers and poles and 155 stations and substations. ITCTransmission operates, maintains and invests in the transmission infrastructure in order to improve efficiency in the flow of electricity, enhance system reliability and lower overall delivered energy costs.

Green Power Express – Once built the Green Power Express transmission project will traverse portions of North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois and Indiana and will ultimately include approximately 3,000 miles of extra high-voltage (765 kV) transmission. Project cost is estimated at between \$10 and \$12 billion.

Joe Bennett, Director of Facilities and Security – Presented the construction aspects of the Novi facility involving time lines and the environmental as well as security items embedded within the site and project.

Darrel Yohnk, Director, Real Time Operations – Provided a brief description of the grid and toured three groups to the viewing room. It was *Patriot Games* at its finest and a teenager's video game to the "nth" degree.

Joe Dudak, Vice President, Major Contracts and Special Projects – Gave a terrific presentation on the historic, present and future transmission needs and how ITC is accommodating these requirements.

Christine Mason Soneral, Vice President and General Counsel of Utility Operations – Provided insight on the acquisition of required easements to accommodate the increasing demand for energy and the transmission of this energy. Discussion pertained to the acquisition and sometimes litigation involved in the easements.

We are very fortunate to have ITC assist our Chapter in this membership meeting. We thank Barbara Mention for assisting in the coordination of this event and the entire ITC Group for being great Hosts.

Ethics and the Right of Way Profession

Course Description: This course combines lecture and practical learning exercises as a means of exchanging ideas and solutions to ethical conflicts.

This course outlines the concept of ethics and acquaints the IRWA Member with the Rules of Professional Conduct and Disciplinary Procedures.

Successful completion of this Course, or Course 104, "Standards of Practice for the Right of Way Professional," is a requirement for initial completion and recertification of the SRWA Designation and Certification Program and is mandatory every five years for recertification purposes.

Topics: At the conclusion of this course, participants should be able to:

- Express, in their own words, the basic concepts contained in the IRWA Code of Ethics (Code) and the Rules of Professional Conduct (Rules)
- Understand why the Code and Rules are important to them as professionals
- Know where to find and how to broadly apply the Code and Rules
- Have a general working knowledge of the disciplinary regulations that administer the Code and Rules
- Recognize inappropriate professional behavior and identify situations that may produce complaints about ethics
- Provide practical suggestions for resolving conflicts of ethics when they occur

California decision affects wind energy

CASPER, WY – The California Public Utilities Commission recently adopted a measure that may have a negative effect on Wyoming's wind energy market.

In March, the commission issued an order limiting the volume of tradable renewable energy credits that public utilities there can buy to meet California's renewable portfolio standard.

On the face of it, it may sound like a good thing for Wyoming wind developers. But officials here say the order views Wyoming wind as a renewable credit rather than deliverable renewable power.

"They created another round of chaos in the marketplace as it relates to these proposed (wind energy and electrical transmission) projects," said Steve Ellenbecker, executive director of the Wyoming Infrastructure Authority.

The order is on hold, for now. California's major public utilities are opposed to the measure, as are wind developers outside the Golden State. The move has had a chilling effect on at least one major electrical transmission proposal aimed at sending Wyoming wind energy to the desert Southwest.

"Wyoming wind should be very attractive to the California market. But clearly there are some regulatory and political issues in California that cloud the opportunities for Wyoming's renewables," said John Dunn, manager of TransCanada's Zephyr Power Transmission Line Project.

The proposed Zephyr transmission line would tap into about 3,000 megawatts of wind energy in the Medicine Bow area and connect to Idaho, then span south through eastern Nevada to south of Las Vegas.

TransCanada also proposes to construct the Chinook Power Transmission Line — a 3,000-megawatt-capacity line from south-central Montana to southern Nevada.

Dunn said TransCanada recently secured agreements with "credit-worthy" wind developers to meet the 3,000-megawatt capacity for the \$3 billion Zephyr line.

"Permitting costs are on order of \$80 million. So this is a major investment decision.

We're looking for greater certainty in making a decision" to move forward, Dunn said.

Dunn suspects California's budget crisis places a lot of pressure on state leaders there to create as many jobs as possible. Developing renewable energy in the state is viewed as one way to do that.

There are seven proposals to construct new high-voltage transmission lines from Wyoming to large urban areas of the desert Southwest, with the California market being the major target. Ellenbecker said California's tradable renewable energy credit order jeopardizes not only the Zephyr project, but it likely injects some amount of uncertainty into all projects backed by independent developers.

The Energy Gateway South and Energy Gateway West projects, for example, likely are not affected because those are backed by large public utilities with stronger financial wherewithal.

Ellenbecker said he's attended several state-level agency meetings in California regarding renewable energy, and the desire to develop in-state resources is strong — and not just in California.

"States are falling all over themselves to promote in-state renewable development. You ought to see the unions, material suppliers and contractors cry out for California to build the resources there for the benefit of their economy and jobs," Ellebecker said.

While he believes states should develop their own renewable sources of energy, Ellenbecker said it's also vital to integrate the entire Western grid with renewable energy, fossil fuels and all energy sources.

"It's to the customers' advantage to develop (energy) at the lowest cost, and to integrate the grid," said Ellenbecker.

Book Review

Valerie Lafferty, SR/WA

Randal O'Toole, author of *Gridlock: Why We're Stuck in Traffic and What To Do About It*, (published 2009 by the Cato Institute*) starts from the premise that government transportation philosophy favors less cars and more rail. The author believes the current costly planning philosophy will fail because rail will be underutilized, therefore will lead to more congestion, less mobility, and a continuing dampening of our overall economy without benefit to environment or energy savings. He supports his argument with several examples of why cars, with their increased mobility, account for much of America's wealth, better housing options, most affordable goods as well as provide the freedom/liberty we all enjoy. Mr. O'Toole believes the light rail concept is trying to replicate the synergies of European mixed-used towns versus the reality of our own American experience. Other than pay-to-use as an alternative to the more public scope of rail, the author offers somewhat vague references to using the latest technologies and dealing with negative effects in a cost-efficient manner as being viable options. *Gridlock* is one point of view and important to the continuing discussion of transportation and land-use planning.

*Cato Institute, according to Wikipedia, is "a pro-free market, libertarian think tank headquartered in Washington, D.C."

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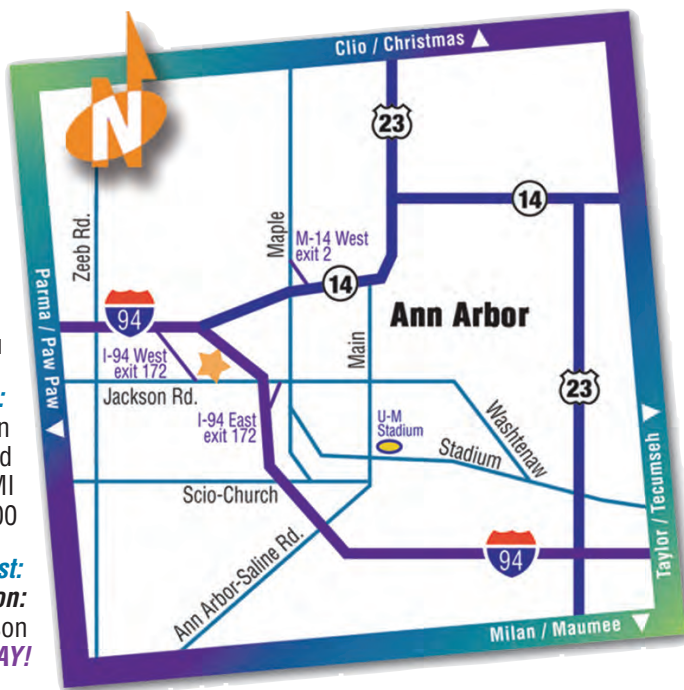
